## Wallace wins 0-5000 Mini-Spingold

The team captained by Barbara Wallace was plagued by a series of unfortunate accidents away from the table, but overcame the obstacles to win the Mini-Spingold I (0-5000) Knockout Teams.

Playing with Wallace was Brian Gunnell, Rich Pavlicek, Mark Jaeger and Lisa Kow. They defeated the squad of Marjorie Michelin, David Anding, Ken Titow, Andy Vinock and Ed Ulman 119-104.

Wallace experienced a personal tragedy early in the week when she learned that her best friend Maddy had died suddenly in Florida.

"I flew back to Fort Lauderdale as soon as I could when I heard that Maddy died," said Wallace. "I played half the match on Wednesday (the quarterfinals) and left for Florida. I got permission from

the directors to miss the semifinal match on Thursday to attend the funeral, then I caught the early flight back to Long Beach Friday morning to play in the final."

Wallace expressed gratitude to the directing staff for allowing her temporary departure from the event.

Teammate Lisa Kow had a medical emergency on Friday and missed the entire final.

Despite the chaos, the Wallace team withstood a strong challenge from Michelin, who reduced a 27-IMP lead by Wallace at the half to 3 IMPs by the end of the third quarter. Wallace stayed in control, however, winning by 15.

## Levin, Weinstein take IMP Pairs

Robert Levin and Steve Weinstein have added yet another bridge title to their collection by winning the four-session Lehar IMP Pairs. Levin, of Bronx NY, and Weinstein, of Andes NY, posted a final tally of 101.22, well ahead of runners-up Mitch Dunitz and Iftikhar Baqai. Dunitz, of Sherman Oaks CA, and Baqai, of Irvine CA, finished with 79.17.

With two rounds to go, Dunitz and Baqai led the event, but their final two rounds "weren't good" according to Dunitz, who predicted that he and Baqai would fall several places in the standings. Levin and Weinstein, meanwhile, bid and made a slam on the final round to help push them from second place into first.

In third with 76.49 were Ed Schulte of Tampa FL and Joseph Godefrin of Sarasota FL.

Levin and Weinstein were members of the Spingold team captained by Jimmy Cayne. The

## Meckstroth tops "Micro" Spingold

The winners of the Mini-Spingold II (0-1500) Knockout Teams are Matt Meckstroth, Rob Meckstroth, Jim Hawkes, Richard Regan and Andrew Hurd. They won convincingly in yesterday's final against the squad of Bruce Blakely, Fred Stout, Nancy Ferguson and David Bryant 213-103.

Matt Meckstroth, 20, is a student at the University of Florida studying economics. His brother Rob, 17, will be a freshman at the University of Florida this fall. The brothers frequently play together.

"We emphasize card play and defense when we play or practice. With school, we don't have the time to devote to studying complex bidding con-

ventions," said Matt.

Asked whether their well-known father coaches them, the answer is a fairly quick no.

"We've pretty much learned the game on our own. Dad's never tried to persuade us to get into bridge, but if we have a question, we ask him."

Hurd, 21, is a senior at the College of Charleston studying business administration.

Fellow Charlestonian Hawkes and Regan (of Inman SC) are the "senior" members of the team.

Regan is a former Navy Seal, and now owns a landscaping business. Hawkes owns a publishing company, and is a former professor of statistics.

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## Vugraph to feature Gates and Buffett

The entire Spingold final will be on vugraph today, under the direction of Chris Compton. The first half will start at 1 p.m. and the second at 8 p.m. The vugraph theater is located in the Convention Center, main level, in Rooms 104 B and C.

A special feature of the show will be interviews with Warren Buffett, perhaps the greatest financier in the world, and Bill Gates, head of Microsoft. Both are competing in the Master Mixed Teams, but they will take the time to be interviewed by Compton.

Working with Compton on the commentary will be David Berkowitz, Larry Cohen, Jeff Meckstroth, Eric Rodwell and George Jacobs.

## Spingold final: Welland vs. Meltzer

The final of the Spingold Knockout Teams will feature squads captained by Roy Welland and Rose Meltzer.

Welland (Bjorn Fallenius, Zia Mahmood, Michael Rosenberg, Adam Zdmudzinski and Cezary Balicki) defeated the four-handed team of Gerald Sosler, Kay Schulle, Massimo Lanzarotti and Andrea Buratti 192-159. Welland jumped out to a 71-32 first-quarter lead. Sosler rallied in the third quarter to trail only by 10, but never got any closer. Welland won by 33.

Meltzer dominated the first half of their match with Nickell. A huge 69-11 first quarter lead was increased by half time to 104-32. Nickell cut the lead by 10 IMPs in the third quarter, and then outscored Meltzer 30-1 in the last set, but it was not enough. Meltzer advanced 137-104.

David Berkowitz found a neat line of play to bring home a difficult notrump game on this Spingold deal. He saw that he probably would be unable to use dummy's clubs because dummy's entry was destroyed by the opening spade lead. But the clubs still played a key role in the play.

Andrea Buratti led the ♠Q to dummy's ace, and Berkowitz took the diamond finesse, losing to the king. Buratti switched to the ♣Q and Berkowitz ducked! Buratti tried a diamond to declarer's 10, and Berkowitz led a low heart. Buratti took this and led another diamond. Berkowitz cashed his last diamond, and Massimo Lanzarotti was feeling the pinch. He was forced to save three hearts and the ♣K 6. So Berkowitz cashed his two high hearts and the ♠K and tucked Lanzarotti in with his ♥10.

Mittelman led the ♥5 despite the opening bid, and Katz let it ride to his 8. He led a diamond to the jack, and Mittelman ducked. A spade to the 8 lost to the 9, and Mittelman continued his heart attack, his queen going to the ace. Katz led a spade to his ace, and Mittelman contributed the jack. Katz switched back to diamonds, his king going to the ace. Mittelman drove out dummy's ♥K, and declarer had no good counter. He led a heart to Mittelman's 10, but Mittelman returned the favor by leading a heart to the 9. Now dummy was down to all clubs. Hoping for a favorable lie, declarer called for the ♣A and then led a second club to the queen and king, but Mittelman still had his third club which he led to partner's jack for the setting trick.

## Nominations open for 2004 Hall of Fame

ACBL members are encouraged to propose names for consideration to be nominated by the Hall of Fame Committee. Proposals will be accepted July 1 through Sept. 30.

Admission to the ACBL Bridge Hall of Fame may occur in four ways:

- (1) Election as a living member by electors. Living nominees must have attained the age of 60 by Jan. 1, 2004.
- (2) Election as a deceased member by electors.
- (3) Selection for the Blackwood Award by the ACBL Hall of Fame Committee. The Blackwood Award is given to individuals who have contributed greatly to the game of bridge without necessarily being world class players.
- (4) Selection for the von Zedtwitz Award by the ACBL Hall of Fame Committee. The von Zedtwitz Award is given to individuals who have achieved prominence in the game of bridge and have an outstanding tournament record.

The primary basis for consideration in any category is the player's domestic and international success and achievements as a member of the ACBL. An individual's history, whether good or bad, may be considered in nominating candidates or selecting recipients.

ACBL members are encouraged to propose names for consideration. An ACBL member making a suggestion should include his or her player number.

# A mole's eye view

When you play Nick Nickell's team, you don't have just a double threat to contend with. Nick and Dick (Freeman) demonstrated graphically that they too are a pair to be reckoned with.

From our second set with them in our second-round loss by 21 IMPs comes a pair of deals. On one we were the biter and on the other we were bitten.

We reached 3NT after Nickell opened 2♠. Jeff Aker overcalled 3♦ and I gambled 3NT.

Nickell led a mean ♥5. I could see no choice but to clear diamonds so I let Freeman in with the ♦Q. He played back a low heart – and Nickell did not fall for the trap of winning the 10 and blocking the suit. He went up with the king and returned the ♥10. Down one and a 13-IMP loss. Why? Well, Jeff Meckstroth in the other room overcalled 2♠ with 2NT! Eric Rodwell used Stayman, putting our teammates off the heart lead. After the ♠K opening lead the hand was over. Sometimes it doesn't pay to get up!

On our next deal we got a little too high – and the issue was which nice thing to pray for.

On the lead of the ♣J, Nickell, a very sound overcaller, rated to be 4-5-2-2, 3-6-2-2 or 4-6-2-1. I won the ♣K, crossed to the ♣A as Nickell produced the 10, ruffed a spade, played the ♥A and ruffed a heart. Then I played the ♠A and ruffed a spade. When Nickell followed low and then produced the ♠Q, I decided my last chance was to find him with a 3-6-2-2 shape or the bare ♦K. My plan was to cash the ♦A and exit with a diamond. Nickell would be down to ♥K-J-x-x and be forced to lead the ♥K. I'd ruff, ruff a spade back to hand, pitch dummy's club on the ♥Q and win the Best Hand of the Year Award . . .

Well, the ♦A dropped the king, so I settled for my 13-IMP gain. This was the full deal:

## Good combination – matchpoints and money

Chris Compton collected almost all the matchpoints on this deal from the BPT Money Prize Championship Individual. He executed a crisscross squeeze to take all 13 tricks in his notrump contract. The result helped him place first in the event and win the \$4000 top prize.

Compton, South, felt his hand was too strong to simply overcall 1♠, so he doubled. When his partner responded in diamonds, he leaped to the notrump game.

West led his partner's suit, hearts, and that was a big help to Compton. He won the jack with the ace and cashed a spade. Then he unblocked hearts by crossing to the queen and came back to his hand to run spades and hearts. This was the position with one spade left to cash.

Compton led his last spade and pitched a club from dummy. East was helpless. If he pitched a diamond, Compton would cash the ♦A, go to the ♣A and win the ♦J. If East sluffed a club, Compton would go to the ♣A, cross back to the ♦A and cash the ♣Q. Compton collected all 13 tricks.

Compton is very impressed with the format of the Individual. "Everybody is playing the same card, so there are no Alerts, no Announcements, no questions, no appeals. There are no problems about unauthorized information or misinformation. The game proceeds very smoothly."

Compton feels that the questions asked at the table often lead to appeals. "I think allowing questions is a questionable value," he said. "I'd like to see events sorted by the conventions being used – you know – Strong Club, two-over-one, Standard American. That would cut way back on the appeals we have in today's bridge."

Compton has done well in the money Individuals. He placed second in the New York event, but he failed to place in Miami.

## Tricky problems

After an auction such as 1♥ - 4♣ - Dbl - Pass; 4♠, you are declarer on the lead of the ♣Q. What is the right play at trick two? Probably a spade from dummy – not a good idea if trumps are 4-0 you might think, but you'll still get one club ruff since South won't be able to play four rounds of trumps without giving up a trump trick.

If you ruff a club to hand to lead a trump up to dummy, you run into a nasty problem. North takes the ace to lead a third club (on some lies of the cards this would create an extra trick for North-South). On the actual lie South has a chance to give West a problem by ruffing his partner's winner to lead a diamond through. Should you finesse or play for the hearts to split 4-3 (no certainty on this auction)? In this case you should rise with the ♦A to set up hearts, pitching diamonds from dummy at every turn.

By coincidence, our next deal features A-K-Q-10-8 again.

Say you reach the normal contract of 4♥ by South on the most challenging opening lead of the ♣10. Win the club, draw trumps, then exit with the ♦A and another. West will win and return a club. You take the trick in dummy to play a third club. If and when the defense leads spades for you, they cannot get more than one trick in the suit. But if you lead the suit for yourself, you might lose two tricks if you guess badly.

## Those Swedish guys sure know how to bid

Sweden's Peter Fredin made a nice decision on the following hand from the fourth round of the Spingold. Fredin is a member of the squad captained by Lou Ann O'Rourke; they were battling the #2 seed led by Nick Nickell. Take Fredin's cards and see how well you do.

As North, you hold

♠ A K 5 ♥ K 10 9 7 6 ♦ 10 3 ♣ A J 10.

On your left, Bob Hamman deals and opens 3♣. Your partner, Magnus Lindkvist, bids 3NT, and RHO, Paul Soloway, bids 4♦. What now?

Without agreements, this is certainly a challenging hand to describe, but the Swedes play that a double in this situation shows values without a clear direction. Without this understanding, you would probably be forced into a 5♦ cuebid. That itself isn't bad, but given the choice, you would probably want to convey the same information at a lower level, hence the double is more flexible.

Assuming you have cleared that hurdle, partner now bids 5♣, natural. Your next call is reasonably obvious: the 5♦ cuebid is cheap and tortures partner for one more round, always a desirable goal.

Partner responds 5♥, no doubt confirming the ♥A. What next?

Partner could have signed off in 6♣, so 5♥ has to be taken as encouraging. The strain of your eventual contract could be in hearts or clubs (or even notrump), but clubs is no doubt safest which is paramount at IMPs.

What's going on in the diamond suit? Partner bid 3NT over 3♦ so he certainly has some diamond control. Is it the ace or is it K-x? The opponents preempted at the three level and raised the suit. The auction suggests, therefore, that they have a 10-card fit. If that's the case, partner is looking at a singleton diamond. True, the opponents could be screwing around and actually have a 9-card fit, but that would mean partner had K-x and he might well have decided to sign off over the 5♦ cuebid with that holding.

So you back your judgment and leap to 7♣, and you are rewarded with this layout:

## Bridge humor with Joel

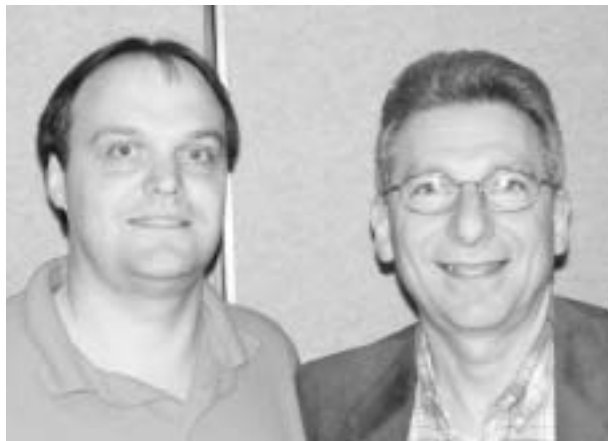

After winning the opening heart lead, declarer tried the ♦10. Horton took this with – the king! She led a heart to set up her suit. Declarer of course was sure she knew where the ♦J was, so she led a diamond to the 9. Horton surprised declarer with the jack and proceeded to take her heart tricks to set the contract two tricks.

Flight B/C/D apparently is getting tougher all the time.

## A heartless defense

North-South reached the excellent 5♦ contract on this Spingold deal, but Douglas Ross and Daniel Boye found a beautiful defense to defeat the contract before declarer could even gain the lead.

John Diamond sat West and led the ♠9, covered by the queen and Platnick's ace, declarer following with the 5. Back came the ♠7, and declarer won the 10. Next came the ♥K to Diamond's ace and Platnick's ♥7 (standard count). What should West do now?

Well, presumably declarer has a strong 3-1-6-3 and partner's ♥7 is suit preference, warning against clubs. BUT: East could have signaled count with either the ♥7 or the ♥9, so it's not clear if this suggests something in clubs.

Probably the bottom line is that partner needs a minor suit ace to set the game, so you should play him for the ♦A. Lead a trump to partner, take your spade ruff, then exit with a low heart. Declarer gets one discard, but that's not enough.

## Compton wins \$4000 In Money Individual

Gary Tomczyk of Las Vegas and G. S. Jade Barrett of Vancouver WA were tied at 81 match-points after 21 boards. With just three boards to go there were six players who had 60% games or better: Tomczyk (64%), Barrett (64%), Sorin Samanta of Rochester MN (62%), Chris Compton of Dallas (61%), Leo Bell of Long Beach (60%) and Tarek Radjef of Dallas (60%).

When the last round was tallied up, Compton's 62% game put him in first place worth \$4,000 and 15.31 gold points. Barrett held on to second worth \$2,000 and 11.48 gold, with a smaller 62% game. Bell squeaked ahead of the falling Tomczyk with a 59% game, good for \$1,000 and 8.61 gold. Tomczyk lost his grip on the brass ring and had to settle for \$500 and 6.80 gold for his 58% game.

Tomczyk said, "With the last three boards, I could have had three tops. I was in a position to dictate the outcome and engineered three bottoms for myself. I knew I had a good game up to the last round. I can fault no one but myself."

Chris Compton, when asked what he was doing with his prize money, said he's going to set it aside for his girls' college fund. When asked for a hand that helped him win the event, Compton explained a crisscross squeeze. The writeup on this deal appears on page 3.

"The \$12,000 Los Angeles Open II was the best attended event (100 competitors) in BPT history," stated Larry King, BPT Prize Money Bridge vice president. Los Angeles attendance was up more than 100%. The prior top attendance in BPT was the 2002 edition of Las Vegas (96). The third-place attendance is held by the first edition of the \$12,000 Santa Clara Open, a first-time event (86).

Kenneth Lindsay of Laie HI won the consolation tournament, which included two prior BPT Champions-Eddie Rose of Laguna Niguel CA (2001) and Chandler Flickinger of Portola Valley CA (2002). Lindsay won \$100 BPT Bridge Bucks and 1.59 red points. Daniel Hoekstra of Portland OR took second while Annette Goldberg of Berkeley CA placed third.

In its first two years, BPT Prize Money Bridge has staged nine events on the West Coast and one on the East Coast. This year there will be six West Coast events and four East and Midwest events. In its second year, BPT inaugurated the \$10,000 Bonus Pool, which rewards the top 32 prize money earners of the year. For 2003 the Bonus Pool was raised to \$20,000. Long Beach was the seventh event of the \$120,000 BPT Prize Money Tour 2003.

The \$12,000 New York Open marked the first event of the 2003 Tour. It was followed in April with San Diego and Miami, and Cleveland in May. The tour continued in Las Vegas and Chicago IL. The tour continues in Secaucus NJ the first week of August.

## Kasle, Lynch teams in World Seniors

Two teams with multiple international titles and North American championships have won the right to represent the United States in the World Seniors Bowl, to be played in Monte Carlo during the world championships which include the Bermuda Bowl and Venice Cup.

Gaylor Kasle, Roger Bates, Steve Robinson and Kit Woolsey won all their matches during the U. S. Senior Bridge Championships, played in conjunction with the Las Vegas regional in June. Their victory won them designation as U.S.I.

U.S.II will be Carolyn Lynch (non-playing captain), Dennis Dawson, Arnold Fisher, Zeke Jabbour, Clement Jackson, John Mohan and John Sutherland.

Thirteen teams entered this year's event and eight qualified for the quarterfinal round. Kasle recorded a 147-51 victory over Rosen (Bob Rosen, Andy O'Grady, Bill Howe and Steve Pawliger) in the quarterfinal round and took out Freed (Gene

Freed, Nels Erickson, Garey Hayden, Joe Kivel, Chris Larsen and John Onstott) 107-73 in the semifinal.

In the other bracket, Lynch defeated Team Nagy (John Carruthers, George Mittelman, Joey Silver, Neil Chambers, John Schermer and Russ Ekeblad) 139-120 in the quarterfinal round and Baze (Grant Baze, Bruce Ferguson, Russ Arnold, Chuck Burger, Jim Sternberg and Allan Cokin) 134-101 in the semifinal round.

Kasle got off to a fast start in the final, taking

the first set 30-18 and the second set 35-26. They led Lynch 65-44 at the halfway mark. The teams battled to a 32-32 tie in the third set but Kasle took the final set 64-13 and claimed a 161-89 victory.

Meanwhile, Smith (Ron Smith, Linda Smith, Bob Bernstein and Cindy Bernstein) came out of the repechage bracket to take on Lynch. Lynch led all the way and, going into the last set, had a 106-76 lead. Smith rallied, taking the final set 48-32, but it was not enough. Lynch claimed victory by a margin of 138-124.

**The Facts:** 6♥ doubled went down one, +100 for N/S. The opening lead was the ♠A. The Director was called by East-West after the tray returned with the 5♠ and 6♥ bids. East-West said that South had broken tempo before doubling 5♥ (East-West thought the double of 5♥ had taken 30-35 seconds; North-South did not contest this but later said they thought it was only 20-25 seconds).

However, all of the players agreed that South's double of 5♥ had been out of tempo. (South said it took him some time to decide whether North's pass was forcing; he eventually decided it was and doubled.) North said he passed 5♥ intending, if South doubled, to pull to 5♠ to show a maximum.

The Director noted the ACBL screen conditions which state: "It is considered that there can be no implication if a tray returns after 25 seconds or less. This period may be extended in the later stages of a complicated or competitive auction without necessarily creating implications." The Director ruled that South's tempo did not constitute a BIT in the context of the present auction and allowed the table result to stand.

**The Appeal:** East-West appealed the Director's ruling. The appeal was heard between the third and fourth segments but because of the awkward timing of the hearing the case was not screened. In addition to the four players the North-South team captain appointed another team member to attend as an adviser. East-West said that South's double had clearly been out of tempo and suggested doubt about defending 5♥ doubled.

Since the North hand was well-suited to defense with only three trumps (North said that when he bid 2NT he did not realize it showed four-card support) and good controls, once South took a long time to double East-West believed he was no longer entitled to override that decision and bid 5♠. South said that when 5♥ came around to him he took time to decide whether North's pass was forcing. He had a minimum for his previous bidding, poor defense, and would have passed 5♥ had he thought he was permitted to do so.

However, he thought he was forced to bid or

double so he doubled. When asked what their partnership rules were about when a pass was forcing North-South's said that normally when they held at least 22-23 combined HCP they treated passes as forcing, but at the five level only about 20-21 HCP were needed. North-South's adviser pointed out that North-South's actions at the table clearly indicated that they both considered North's pass forcing:

North passed with 2-1/2 quick tricks opposite an opening bid and South doubled 5♥ with a hand that had no reason to do so unless he thought he was forced to take further action. South additionally said that his hand was a minimum with unexceptional shape (5431) and controls—not even a six- or seven-card suit to suggest further action. Thus, his tempo did not convey unauthorized information (UI) to his partner.

North said he erred when he bid 2NT over 2♥ and might better have bid 3♥ (showing 11+ points with at least three trumps) or even 4♥ (a splinter raise). However, when he bid 2NT he did so with the hope that he would have a chance to show "extras" later in the auction (by bidding 4♥ over either South's 3♠ signoff or East's competitive 3♥).

When asked how he planned to show his extras if, for example, South jumped to 4♠ over 2NT he said had not anticipated that and reiterated that his decision to bid 2NT had been a poor one.

**The Committee Decision:** The Committee considered two issues which were in conflict with one another. On the one hand, the screen regulations state that there should be no presumption of unauthorized information when the tray returns within 25 seconds or less. But while the BIT was allegedly longer than this (30-35 seconds), the regulations also say that this period may be extended in a complicated or competitive auction, which this surely was.

So the Director's ruling, while subjective, was consistent with the regulations and supported the intent behind them which was to induce players to vary the tempo of their auctions so that a delay of about 25 seconds in a complex or competitive auction would not stand out as a BIT.

On the other hand, the Committee had no doubt that there had been a defacto BIT, that the unauthorized information made pulling the double more attractive, and that the North hand had every reason to sit for the double with only three spades and excellent defensive values. And while South's 3♠ bid suggested that he might have extra spade length, his double of 5♥ suggested otherwise.

To help the Committee resolve this conflict the chairman described a case he had presented to the ACBL Laws Commission a few days earlier in which the Directors at the USBF Team Trials had adjusted a result on a board, ruling that a delay (behind screens) of only 20 seconds constituted a BIT when all four players agreed that the tray had been moving back and forth very fast and that the 20-second delay made it clear that a specific player had broken tempo.

The consensus of the Laws Commission was that the Directors had ruled appropriately in that case, in effect giving Directors (and Appeals Committees) the authority to treat the 25 seconds specified in the screen regulations as an approximate rather than a fixed standard which could be adjusted downward as well as upward and in which not only the context of the auction (complicated or competitive) but also the perceptions of the players could be taken into account in judging whether a BIT had occurred.

Given this added information the Committee decided in the present case that there had been a BIT which made North's 5♠ bid more attractive and that pass was a logical alternative. The Committee disallowed North's 5♠ bid and discussed the possible results in 5♥ doubled. While several leads were possible, it was judged both "at all probable" and "likely" that North would lead the ♠A as he had against 6♥ doubled. Therefore, the contract was changed to 5♥ doubled made five, +650 for East-West.

**Dissenting Opinion** (Mark Feldman): While I personally disagree with the screen regulations' choice of 25 seconds as the period within which there is to be no presumption of unauthorized information (15-20 seconds seems more realistic), the regulation makes it clear that it is the players' responsibility to make sure, by controlling the pace of the tray as suggested in the screen regulations, that delays of about 25 seconds are not perceived as BITs—especially in high-level competitive auctions as in the present case.

We should not condone the players' failure to accept this responsibility by adjusting the result, especially when it was never established (at least not to my satisfaction) that the delay was actually as long as 25 seconds. The regulation is clear that delays of up to 25 seconds or so should not be considered BITs and in this auction the tray should have been delayed on the South-West side of the screen for about that long even if South had acted quickly over 5♥.

It was only because the players established through their quick tempo that they would not do this that this problem arose. Thus, the regulations should have been enforced as the Directors did in making their ruling. I would have allowed the table result to stand.

**Chairman's Note:** Good arguments have been given for deciding this case both as the Committee did and as the above dissenter suggests. The problem is that the ACBL Laws Commission has chosen to allow the screen regulations to remain in effect specifying a "UI-free" time period—25 seconds—that on practical grounds is too long to live with comfortably; their ratification of the ruling at the Team Trials mentioned above is evidence of that.

Everyone who has played in or Directed screen events knows that 25 seconds is an eternity behind screens and most players will not hold the tray for anywhere near that long. The EBL and WBF screen regulations specify only a 15-second UI-free time period in these situations and there is no reason why we should not change ours to be consistent with theirs and to make them more "livable."

If it is accurate to say that it takes about 10 seconds for the tray to return normally, players should be willing hold it for another 5-10 seconds (making the total time 15-20 seconds) in tempo-sensitive situations but asking them to delay it for an extra 15 seconds or more is asking too much.

I ask the Laws Commission and/or the Conventions and Competition Committee to reconsider this regulation, to shorten the specified time period to 20 seconds or even 15, and in the future to have ACBL Directors enforce the new 15-20 second time period as written.

**The Facts:** The Director was called after trick nine, with South on lead. Declarer, who had already lost three tricks, claimed saying he would be able to take the rest of the tricks. South was known to hold one spade and three hearts, but declarer made no clarifying statement until the Director arrived. The Director awarded a trick to North-South and assigned the contract of 4♠ down one, +100 for N/S (Law 70E: unstated line of play).

**The Appeal:** East-West appealed the Director's ruling and were the only players to attend the hearing. East claimed that he said "I have the rest; I'll give my line of play after the lead." When the Director arrived at the table he stated that on a heart lead he would finesse the queen as it was the only way to make the contract. He said he had the hand counted out and knew that South's remaining cards were one spade and three hearts.

East-West each had between 500 and 600 masterpoints. The Reviewer spoke to the other side during the next session to ask them what declarer said when he made the claim. They said he only said "I have the rest, lead"; South thought East did not even say "lead" until the North-South hands had been exposed. They said that no mention was made of the heart finesse until the Director arrived at the table. East-West had about 350 masterpoints each.

**The Panel Decision:** The Panel believed that it was significant that the claimer stated "I have the rest" (in both versions of the claim) since even on his stated line he does not "have the rest" if the ♥Q is offside (although the bidding and the play to that point indicated that it probably was onside). The Panel believed that there was some doubt as to whether East had remembered that South still held a trump. Since the Panel thought it was likely that claimer was unaware that a trump remained in the South hand, the Panel did not allow East to take the heart finesse and awarded a trick to North-South. The result was assigned as 4♠ down one, +100 for North-South.
