Not that it hasn't been a lot of work, but the two are well pleased to see the Summer NABC heading for an unexpected 13,000 tables – and getting lots of positive comments from the players.

Radoslaw Kielbasinski, president of the Polish Bridge Union, is in New York City as the head of the Polish school teams, and has taken time to observe all of the bridge competition at the Summer NABC.

He was proud to note the victory by his young countrymen in the first World Schools Team Championship, but not surprised. The team fielded by Poland in the event organized by the World Bridge Federation was very strong, Kielbasinski says. A member of the team, Michal Nowosadzki, won the 1st World Junior Individual Championship as well.

A brief talk with Kielbasinski reveals quite a contrast in the status of bridge between his nation

Double trouble

This deal from the second session of the IMP Pairs is another illustration of how dangerous it can be to double holding a trump stack, thus alerting declarer to the distribution. My partner was Eric Leong, sitting South.

West started with the ♣K to Leong's ace. Eric, who lives in Oakland CA, figured trumps were 5-0, and he played accordingly. He went to dummy with the ♦A and passed the ♠Q, then led a diamond to the king and ruffed a diamond.

Eric then ruffed a club and played a good diamond from hand, discarding a spade from dummy. East ruffed and played the ♠K, smothering dummy's now-singleton ♠Q, but Eric was still in control. He won the ♠A and ruffed a spade. This was the position as Eric played a club:

Eric had eight tricks in at this point and could not be prevented from taking two more. If East ruffs in with the ♥K or ♥Q, he would have to return a trump. Eric would simply put in the ♥J for trick nine with the trump ace to come. If East did not ruff high, Eric would score his trump jack one trick earlier.

Plus 790 was good for a 10-IMP gain. Well played, Eric.

Computer finalists: Bridge Baron, Jack

The World Computer Championship final today will be a repeat of last year's final – Jack (the Netherlands) vs. Bridge Baron (USA).

Bridge Baron finished first in the eight-computer round-robin and beat Micro Bridge (Japan), 143-101, in their 64-board semifinal. Jack finished third in the round-robin and then defeated Wbridge5 (France), 157-118, in the semis.

The final will start at 9 this morning in Concourse H.

A most interesting deal arose in the match between Jack and Wbridge5. You can make at least 12 tricks in notrump from one side, but there are serious dangers of going set in 3NT if played from the other side.

This was the Jack auction – well done indeed. Not only was it played from the correct side, it was also played in slam. East's 1♠ bid gave the partnership plenty of room to learn the strength of the combined hands. Jack actually made seven when South did not lead the ♥A.

This was the Wbridge5 auction. East's jump to 2♠ took up a lot of bidding room, so East-West never were able to determine the great strength they had between them. They wound up in 3NT, but they couldn't even make that. The Jack North led the ♥Q and the defenders quickly grabbed the first five tricks for plus 1570 on the board.

and North America, where the ACBL is working to promote the game and enhance its credibility.

In Poland, bridge rivals every sport except the national passions of soccer and volleyball — and there is no question in that country that bridge is truly a sport.

In the nation of 37 million people, 2 million of them play bridge, although the Polish Bridge Union has only about 7000 members. That's because membership in the PBU is all about playing on teams in regular competitions. Most of the players don't have the time or inclination to keep up with the schedule of play that is required.

That doesn't mean the Polish players are not flocking to the bridge clubs and tournaments, however. It's just that they aren't seeking masterpoints. At nearly every tournament, says Kielbasinski, at least 50% of the entry fees go into a pool for cash prizes.

Meanwhile, bridge gets lots of positive publicity. Once a year, there is a special promotional game under the patronage of the marshal of Poland's Parliament, a position analogous to the Speaker of the House of Representatives in the U.S.

Many celebrities in Poland — movie stars, sports figures — play and promote bridge, and there are annual competitions among about 20 different professions such as lawyers, doctors, police officers and soldiers.

"To win a championship among soldiers," says Kielbasinski, "is the dream of many officers."

Kielbasinski is general manager of the Warsaw branch of Jyske Bank, the second largest bank in Denmark. There is even a championship for players in his field organized under the auspices of the Polish equivalent of the Securities and Exchange Commission in the U.S.

Reflecting on the success of the young players in the competition in New York, Kielbasinski notes that the structure of bridge in Poland has made the game very popular among young people.

In Poland, there are four categories of play for so-called Juniors: up to 15 years old, 16-18, 19-20 and 21-25. There is a national championship for the young players in each of the categories. There are other competitions they may enter, including one open event.

One of Poland's brightest young players, says Kielbasinski, is Jan Sikora, who played in the pairs trials to select the national team, and came in 11th, an outstanding achievement.

The main role of the PBU is to organize national team championships. The first league, he says, has 16 teams, made up of the country's top players. The second league has four groups of 16 teams, and the third has 16 groups of 16 teams. Players are always trying to advance to the top league. The teams competition begins in autumn and finishes the following May. Travel is involved, along with lots of weekend play, so many Polish players find they don't have the time or the desire to travel, so they skip the teams format.

The winner of the first league competition earns the title of national champions and they represent Poland in the European Cup. Many of the teams, says Kielbasinski, have sponsors — usually companies rather than individuals.

The European Cup differs from the European Bridge League's tournament to select squads for international competition such as the Bermuda Bowl. For the EBL tournament, the Polish team is selected through a pairs trial.

Besides his duties in his regular job and with the PBU, Kielbasinski is a vice president of the EBL and a member of the executive committee of the World Bridge Federation.

He is a non-stop promoter of the game, and with only a little prompting will tell anyone who wants to know about the advantages of bridge over other sports.

Bridge doesn't require physical attributes such as running fast or being very strong or being tall — and you don't have to quit playing when you turn 40. Says Kielbasinski: "It's a sport for life."

Polish youngster victor in 2 events

It appears that Michal Nowosadzki of Poland has a brilliant bridge future ahead of him. The 21-year-old youngster already has two world championships to his credit at this tournament. Yesterday he won the first World Junior Individual, and he was a member of the Polish team that took first place in the World School Championships.

His teammates in the Schools competition were Marcin Malesa, Piotr Nawrocki, Filip Niziol, Prezmyslaw Piotrowoski and Jan Sikora, with Leszek Nowak as non-playing captain.

Nowosadzki stood second after the first two sessions of the four-session Individual, but he climbed into the lead during the third session. Gabby Feiler put strong pressure on him over the

final boards, but Nowosadzki held on to win by .09%. For the four sessions he had 57.97% while Feiler had 57.88.

The highest ranking female was Meike Wortel of the Netherlands, who finished third with 56.34%. America's top finisher was Robert Glickman, who placed fourth with 56.25%.

Nowosadzki has been playing bridge a long time — 15 years — even though he is only 21 years old. His father is an avid bridge player and started his son on his way at just about the time Michal could hold 13 cards. He is now studying economics at the university level.

This is the third World Junior Championship he has attended. He was at Stargard, Poland, in 2001 and Bata, Hungary, last year.

I got a spade lead, and South switched to the ♥K. I played the ♣Q, losing to the king, and South cashed the trump queen. But that was all the defense could get — we got plus 590 by breaking Richie's rule.


Trailing 31-29 after the first quarter, Teaford stormed into the lead with a 71-3 second quarter and cruised to a 164-94 victory.
