Levine victorious in Senior KO again

Mike Levine and Co. successfully defended their Senior Knockouts Teams title against the Mel Colchamiro squad yesterday. The score – 140-106 – seems to indicate that it was a relatively easy victory, but nothing could be farther from the truth. Several times Colchamiro's team got to good contracts, played the hands well, and suffered losses because of unhappy distribution.

Playing with Levine were P.O. Sundelin of Sweden, Zeke Jabbour, Arnie Fisher, Bobby Wolff and Dan Morse. All but Wolff and Morse were on the victorious squad a year ago. In fact, Levine's teams have done

extremely well in Senior competition, with at least one victory in each of the three Senior team events.

Joining Colchamiro were Bernie Miller, Dan Colatosti, John Malley, John Stiefel and Lewis Finkel.

The Levine team led all the way. They took a 31-18 lead in the first quarter and increased their lead by 6 in the second to go out front by 67-48 at the half. A good third quarter gave them a comfortable 125-83 lead going into the final 16 boards. Colchamiro made somewhat of a comeback near the end, but it was too little too late.

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Sidney Lazard and Bart Bramley, Blue Ribbon winners

Lazard, Bramley win Blue Ribbon

Sidney Lazard and Bart Bramley – one of the most respected partnerships in the bridge world – won the Blue Ribbon Pairs last night – the first victory in this event for both players.

It was a hugely popular win as Lazard and Bramley were surrounded by well-wishers. "For an old guy, you do okay," said a smiling Bob Hamman as he gave Lazard a big hug.

"Well done," said Zia who also had a big smile.

For Lazard, this victory marked six decades of winning national events. His first: the Spingold in 1958. The Blue Ribbon Pairs is his 12th North American championship. He has represented the United States in international play. His team was second in the 1959 Bermuda Bowl and third in 1969. He is a member of the Bridge Hall of

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9,610 tables so far

Sometime early this afternoon, the 10,000th table for this tournament will be sold. The total prior to last night's midnight games was 9,610 tables. This makes it likely that as many as 12,500 tables will have played when the tournament closes Sunday evening – a very healthy turnout indeed.

Morse tops 20,000

Jo Morse of Palm Beach Gardens FL, a World Bridge Federation World Life Master and former world champion, has topped the 20,000-masterpoint plateau.

Morse, who won the World Mixed Teams in 1974, was non-playing captain of the winning Venice Cup team in 1993. She was also npc of the Venice Cup team that finished second (by half an IMP) to the Netherlands in 1999 and npc of the team that won a "rematch" with the Dutch team in 2000.

She has won nine North American championships and, in recent years, has divided her play among women's, open and senior events.

Morse reached the milestone plateau while playing with longtime partner Kyle Larsen in the Life Master Open Pairs

Longtime friend Rose Meltzer threw a party to celebrate the success attained by "Jo-Jo." Meltzer says Morse is "the best friend ever. The classiest thing about Jo is that we won the Women's Swiss Teams in Reno in 1998. My team – my open team – became available that year rather than the next year and Jo was the first one to say 'you go for it'."

Others agree that Morse is one of the most popu-

Eddie Kantar and Eddie Wold practiced all week for their table tennis duel and they didn't disappoint more than 200 bridge players who gathered to watch them play last night at the Phoenix Civic Plaza.

The fans got an extra treat as the players warmed up wearing sweat pants and sweatshirts. Wild applause broke out as the two stripped to

shorts and t-shirts to play.

Kantar won the first game 21-14 but Wold claimed the next three games 21-11, 21-17 and 21-19. Both players were energetic, extending rallies with dramatic saves and drawing applause.

Kantar was Minnesota state table tennis champion in 1948 and competed in the World Table

George Rosenkranz led the ♣5! This knocked out the ace and declarer led a heart to the queen and ace. Back came another club to the queen, and declarer took the spade finesse, losing to the king. A third club to the king cleared the suit. Declarer had to go after diamonds, and Geir Helgemo of Norway was able to cash three clubs when he got in with the ♦A to inflict a two-trick set.

Here's your second chance. Playing in the Senior Pairs, you hold:

♠ J 9 7

and you hear this bidding:

What do you lead?

These thoughts went through Jane Segal's mind – LHO bid spades but didn't rebid them, and RHO never raised spades, so partner probably has some kind of holding in the suit. Suiting thought to action, she led the ♠9. This was the complete deal:

Judy Kay, South, wasn't sure where the ♠J was, so she rose with the king. She led a heart to her partner's ace, and Jane shot back the ♠J, enabling Judy to run the suit and set the contract two tricks.

Keller revisited

By choice in my partnerships we do not discuss hands during the session. I find this a big help in improving my results! I named this approach Keller, after Helen Keller, and I put it on all my convention cards. It's a misnomer, since she could speak perfectly well, but the name has stuck.

My partner Steve Nellissen wrote an article about Keller which appeared in *The Bridge World*.

As a reward, or perhaps a penalty, for popularizing this approach, friends and acquaintances sometimes seek me out to report especially egregious Keller violations. This one, board 10 from the Wednesday evening regionally-rated game takes the cake.

Your hand is by far the worst I've ever seen:

♠ 6 4 3
 ♥ 5 2
 ♦ 6 4 3 2
 ♣ 5 4 3 2

Partner opens 1♦ in third seat and you pass. You are not surprised when LHO reopens with a double. Partner redoubles and RHO bids 1♥. It wouldn't occur to me to bid here, but at the table the call was 2♦. Now LHO raises to 2♥ and partner tries 2♠. You retreat to 3♦ and partner raises to 4♦. No one doubles and to your relief 4♦ becomes the final contract.

As you put down the dummy you hear from across the table, "Partner, you didn't bid enough!"

This was the full hand. Note that declarer can make six by getting to dummy with the ♦6 to take a second spade finesse.

Bring your "A" game

Some people wouldn't know a good hand if it jumped up and bit them on the nose. On the other hand, when Jay Stiefel gives you a play problem you can be sure of two things: first, it will be good material for the Bulletin and second, you'd better concentrate pretty hard.

You (South) declare 5♥ on the following auction:

West	North	East	South
		1♠	Pass
4♣	Dbl	Pass	5♥

All Pass

West leads the ♠J and this is what you see:

♠ A 7 4
 ♥ K 10 9 6 3
 ♦ A 5
 ♣ A Q 2

♠ 6
 ♥ A 8 5 4 2
 ♦ K 7 3
 ♣ 10 9 6 4

The best approach is to assume that unless trumps are 3-0, you are cold and if either club honor is right, you are in great shape. So prepare for the worst.

To make your contract, you have to strip off the side suits to effect an endplay, but the problem is that if you ruff two spades, you run out of trumps. The really odd feature is that you don't mind losing a diamond overruff to East; if you do, you'll be able to endplay him later on.

So win the ♠A, ruff a spade, cash the ♦A, lead a diamond to the king and ruff a diamond. Say East overruffs. Ruff the spade return, cash the ♥K A and pass the ♣10 to endplay East. The full layout:

As it happens, East does best not to overruff in diamonds but to pitch a spade.

You now ruff a spade and pass the ♣10 to East – who is then endplayed in two suits, one of which is trumps.

If East leads a spade, declarer ruffs in hand and pitches the club loser. Either a heart or club play gives up a trick in that suit.

Jay admitted he missed this line – (as indeed has everyone else I've given the problem to!) – so all the more thanks to him for bringing this to our attention.

Eddie wins

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Tennis Championships in Stockholm in 1957. He was inducted into the Minnesota state table tennis Hall of Fame in 1996.

Wold is a former Texas state champion. He was once nationally ranked and tried out for the national team. "I just wasn't good enough," he said recently, "so I quit table tennis cold and took up bridge."

Kantar and Wold are both top-ranked bridge players as well. Kantar is a former world champion (Bermuda Bowl in 1977 and 1979) and ACBL Grand Life Master who is perhaps better known for his bridge writings. He has won the American Bridge Teachers Association "Book of the Year" award four times.

Wold, who this week reached the 40,000-masterpoint plateau, won the World Transnational Teams in 2001 and is #5 on the list of all-time masterpoint winners.

Mike Passell, one of Wold's regular partners, made this tongue-in-cheek comment after the match: "I'm not surprised he (Wold) won the match – I am surprised he's won 40,000 masterpoints."

"Gin rummy," he said in no uncertain terms. "You have to remember to stop dealing after 10 cards in gin rummy. In bridge you just keep going until they're all dealt."

Free advice is worth what you pay for it

Kind souls that bridge players are, they rarely hesitate to give their partners the benefit of their advice. It is seldom appreciated, much less heeded. Every now and again, though, you find a partner who takes your counsel to heart. And you have to be careful what you say to him.

Case in point: On Day One of the Blue Ribbon Pairs here, Howard Weinstein of Sarasota FL picked up

♠ K 10 9 5 4
♥ A Q J 7 4 3 2
♦ --
♣ 7

Both sides were vulnerable, and Weinstein's RHO opened 1♣. Weinstein ventured 1♥, and his LHO bid a nonforcing 2NT. Weinstein's partner, Steve Garner of Northfield IL, passed, and opener rebid 5♣. Weinstein passed, as did LHO and Garner. The result: down one for plus 100 for Weinstein and Garner.

The bad news: Par on the board their way was 2210 -- for 7♠, which was frigid.

Now Howard, in case you did not know, is a very fine player, and very experienced. He has six national championships to his credit.

But Garner, who has partnered Weinstein in hundreds of competitions over the years, is a star in his own right. And a generous man with his insights.

"If you choose to overcall 1♥ with a 7-5 hand," Garner advised his partner, "then you *must* bid again when the auction comes back to you – no matter the level."

Day Two of the Blue Ribbon Pairs. Weinstein, in first seat, red versus white, picks up:

♠ K
♥ A 9 7 5 4 3 2
♦ Q 8 6 4 3
♣ --

He opened 2♥. Pass on his left. Pass by partner. 2♠ from RHO. Weinstein dutifully placed the 3♦ card on the table. Double from LHO, who had trap passed the first time with a 1-3-4-5 19 count. All pass.

The result: Minus 1400.

The moral of the story: Free advice is worth what you pay for it.

Morse expressed thanks to husband Jack, “my biggest supporter. In Bermuda, he probably called more than the husbands of the players. And he cried when we lost.”

Morse also thanked Meltzer, Larsen and “the whole team.”

“Jo-Jo is a member of our team,” said Meltzer. “She was late getting to the Team Trials (in 2001) and the whole team was upset.

“There was never any question as to whether Jo-Jo was going to Paris. She was a member of our team.”

New Life Masters

Eddie Rose of Laguna Niguel CA became a Diamond Life Master by winning the single-session Swiss Teams last night. Eddie was the leading money winner on last year’s bridge pro tour. He is a former city councilman in his home town.

Sheila Nickerson of Kailua HI finished third in Strat C of the Mixed Pairs (two section tops), and that was more than enough for her to win her gold card. Her partner was Ron Frystack of Kaneohe HI.

Wesley Hamilton of Sun City AZ already had 794 masterpoints, but he needed about five more golds to become a Life Master. His teammates brought him over the top by winning Bracket 5 of the Bracketed Knockout Teams. He won more than 31 golds and was not only a Life Master, but a Bronze Life Master as well. His partner was Sherman Cohen of Sun City West, who became a Silver Master as a result of the victory. Their teammates were Bob Reed of Sun City West and Ram Hira of North Vancouver BC.

Maria K. Morris of Tucson AZ tied for third in Bracket 8 of the Bracketed Knockout Teams, That’s all she needed to get her gold card. Her partner was Nancy Lord Watts of Tucson, and their teammates were Hans Stocker of Sarasota FL and Marvin Woods of Lacy WA.

Aaron Segal and Janet Schalm of Sun City West AZ went over the top in Bracket 9 of the Bracketed Knockout Teams. Segal needed 2.17 golds and Schalm was .49 short. They got 2.24 golds in this event. Their teammates were Bill Johnson of Columbus MT and Julie Coleman of Billings MT.

Betty Entinger of Lake Havbasu AZ is now a Life Master.

Mike Miller of Temple TX went over 2500 points and is now a Gold Life Master.

Ivy Sternberg of Newmarket ON is now a Silver Life Master after passing the 1000-point mark.

Catherine Montgomery of Scottsdale AZ made the grade in the Compact Knockouts yesterday. She played with Fred Bellon of Phoenix, and their teammates were May Day and Leona Bellon of Phoenix.

Betty Williams of Melbourne FL earned her gold card in the Bracketed Compact Knockouts.

Fame and has established the Sidney H. Lazard Jr. Sportsmanship Award to honor his late son.

Bramley, the 1997 *Player of the Year* (for most masterpoints won in nationally rated events), won his first North American championship – the Men’s Board-a-Match Teams (now the Open Board-a-Match Teams) in 1980. He has won 10 North American championships.

Lazard and Bramley posted a total of 1716.94, almost a full board ahead of runners-up Kit Woolsey and Fred Stewart. Alfredo Versace and George Jacobs were close behind in third, followed by Chris Willenken and Glenn Milgrim.

Willenken and Milgrim were the event leaders going into the last round – their opponents: Lazard and Bramley.

Milgrim led the ♦K and continued with the ♦A. He shifted to a low club: 7, jack, ace. Bramley cashed the ♣K, pitching a heart, and ruffed a club. He led a spade to the jack, losing to the queen. Milgrim played a diamond to dummy’s queen and Bramley ditched his losing heart. He cashed the ♥A and ruffed a heart. He ruffed a club with dummy’s ♠A, then played a spade to his hand. He drew the last trump and cashed his good club. Plus 420 was good for most of the matchpoints.

Bramley conceded that his takeout double – 4-3-3-3 with the ♦K Q – would not be to everyone’s taste but the takeout double, combined with Lazard’s gentle jump to the two level, took up so much bidding space that Willenken-Pilgrim did not have room to discover just how well their hands fit. Making six for minus 170 – and a great score for Lazard-Bramley.

Now Hal led a diamond from dummy and ducked South’s ♦Q. The forced diamond return allowed him to take the last two tricks for plus 490 and a clear win. He was the only declarer to collect plus 490.

Dirty work at the crossroads

If you bid as boldly (should that be as badly?) as I do, you have to learn a few underhand tricks.

Say you reach 6NT on this auction: 1♦–1♥; 2NT–4NT; 6NT. This is the complete layout:

♠ Q 8 ♠ 7 6 4 3
♥ J 10 8 3 ♥ K 9 7 5
♦ A 10 ♦ J 9 8 5
♣ K Q J 5 4 ♣ 9

♠ 10 9 5 2 ♠ A K J
♥ A 6 2 ♥ Q 4
♦ 7 6 2 ♦ K Q 4 3
♣ 8 7 3 ♣ A 10 6 2

On, say, a spade lead, you win in dummy and lead the ♥10. On a really good day, this will be ducked all around. On a moderate day, West will win and return a spade – this lets you squeeze East in the red suits.

However, neither of these things happened to me – I guess I was both unlucky and considerably luckier.

West decided to put me under maximum pressure by leading a low heart at trick one. Now my chances looked a little thin; but I decided to try inserting the ♥8. I knew the heart honors had to be split – no double, no Lightner double.

East decided to cover the ♥8 with the ♥9, letting me win the ♥Q – and a little later on, I had plus 1020, a top and two fuming opponents.

Case 3

Subject: Deficient Claim

The Facts: The play proceeded: ♣K, holding; low spade to West's ace; low club, ruffed by North; low diamond to East's king; diamond to the queen; ♠KJ (declarer pitching diamonds); ♥K; ♥8 to North's queen. At this point, with a trump still outstanding, declarer claimed saying only, "My hand is good." After some discussion the Director was called and ruled that the result was 4♥ down one, +50 for E/W.

The Appeal: N/S appealed the Director's ruling. The two sides were interviewed separately. N/S said that both opponents were putting their hands away, in apparent acceptance of the claim, when West stopped and started talking to East about the validity of the claim.

North said that in her experience (in China, where she learned on the Internet and at her U.S. club) such claims are routinely accepted and she was unaware that she needed to say more than she did with a trump out in order for her claim to be accepted as valid. When asked why she didn't either draw the last trump or state that she would do so, she said she thought it was obvious. E/W said that at the point of the claim East folded up her cards but West kept his in his hand and waited 5-10 seconds to give North a chance to mention the outstanding trump. When she didn't, he mentioned it as he called the Director. West expressed surprise that even then North didn't mention the trump. N/S disputed E/W's account of the events. N/S were non-ACBL members and were sold a Strat B entry by the staff based on their experience, particularly North's.

The Panel Decision: Law 70C addresses this situation. It instructs the Director to award a trick or tricks to the non-claiming side if the claimer failed to mention the outstanding trump, if it is "at all likely" that the claimer was unaware that a trump remained in an opponent's hand, and if a trick could be lost to that trump by any "normal" (i.e. careless or inferior, but not irrational, for the class of player involved) play.

The Panel decided that the first and third conditions were fulfilled but sought advice from three players on how likely it was that a player taking these actions might have forgotten that there was an outstanding trump. One consultant thought it likely that a player who saw his opponent wait for 5-10 seconds and still said nothing had forgotten the trump, but not otherwise. A second consultant thought it was "reasonably likely" that the trump had been forgotten. The third consultant (a "strong" Flight B player) thought it was very likely that this player had forgotten the trump.

Based on this input (which largely matched the Panel's collective judgment), the claimer's inability to come up with a good reason for not mentioning the trump (such as knowing the hand was over when each opponent showed in two trumps twice), and the strict wording of the Law, the Panel assigned the result of 4♥ down one, +50 for E/W. N/S were instructed during the hearing on what to do in the future to avoid this kind of problem.

The Facts: The opening lead was the ♥A. The Director was called following a claim by North. The play to the first four tricks was agreed by all and had gone: ♥A, all following; diamond to declarer's ace; spade to dummy's king; ♠Q, East pitching a club. At this point declarer detached the ♠A, from her hand, faced her cards, and according to E/W she said she would overtake her (second) diamond in dummy, at which point West said she could ruff the diamond.

The E/W players said that neither of them heard any statement to the effect that declarer would pull the fourth round of trumps before overtaking the diamond. South said he did not hear North's claim statement due to his being deaf in one ear.

The Director, who was told that North said at some point before her arrival at the table that trumps were 3-2, ruled that North was unaware of the 4-1 trump break and that West would therefore obtain a diamond ruff. The contract was changed to 6♠ down three, +300 for E/W (Laws 70C2 and 70C3).

The Appeal: N/S appealed the Director's ruling. All players agreed to the auction as presented and the play up to the claim, at which point the statements of several of the players diverged. According to North, after the ♠Q was led she counted her tricks and then showed her hand (or part of it) stating, "Let's see, I've got five spades, six diamonds..."

Before she could say any more West interrupted her to say that she (West) would get a trump trick (by ruffing the second diamond). North said she did not get to complete her claim statement as an exchange between the two sides ensued. She claimed she said nothing about trumps being 3-2 until later in the discussion, by which time any pretense of a formal claim had vanished and she had become a bit flustered and confused.

West said that North detached the ♠A from her hand and said "I'm going to overtake the ♦9..." She (West) had been about to concede the slam until North said that spades were 3-2 -- that everyone had followed to the second round. West believed declarer stated a line of play involving drawing only three rounds of trumps.

North pointed out that the second round of trumps was irrelevant once they were not 5-0. She admitted that she did say that trumps were 3-2 at some point, but only after the players had commenced their discussion/argument.

The Committee Decision: The Committee believed that West interrupted North in the middle of her claim, thus not affording her the opportunity to make a clear statement which could have convicted (or acquitted) her of miscounting trumps. North was obviously a competent player, but equally obviously we have all miscounted trumps. Laws 70C2 and 70C3 have to be invoked in this situation, with any doubt being resolved against the claimer.

The Committee believed that this case falls precisely on the borderline of these provisions and that

"equity" is clearly irrelevant here. Nevertheless, they were compelled to decide whether, on the facts presented, North miscounted trumps or was simply less than clear in stating her line.

The Committee ultimately decided that North was in the process of drawing trumps (rather than having finished the process), that she had not led the third round (although she had detached the ♠A from her hand), that West interrupted her, thereby preventing her from completing her statement, and that nothing North had done to that point suggested that she would have miscounted trumps. The contract was therefore changed to 6♠ made six, +1430 for N/S.

The Facts: 6NT made six, +1440 for N/S. The opening lead was the ♥K. E/W called the Director to the table after the 6NT bid and told him that after East passed 3♣ South hesitated for some time and then belatedly Alerted the 3♣ bid. East asked and was told "fit-showing," after which South bid 4♥. N/S told the Director that in auctions like 1♦-1♥; 3♣-3♥ (only their side bidding) they play 3♥ as better than 4♥.

The Director decided that, while the explanation of 3♣ was unauthorized information, North would have bid again over 4♥ (presumably 5♣) and South would then have bid 5♦, after which North would bid 6♦. The contract was changed to 6♦ made seven, +1390 for N/S.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. West did not attend the hearing. East said that North did not have another bid if he really thought South had a one-suited hand that was weaker than a 3♥ bid would have shown. Further, if North was allowed to bid 5♣ and South preferenced to 5♦, there was no reason to believe that North would bid 6♦. North said that he was taking a wild shot when he bid 6NT and no one would have complained if he went down six. South said that had North bid 5♣ over 4♥ she would have raised to 6♣.

The Panel Decision: The Panel polled five experts on North's likely action over 4♥. Three of the five said they would have passed 4♥. Based on this and the other information, the Panel decided that unauthorized information was present which demonstrably suggested bidding on over 4♥, and that pass was a logical alternative for North. The contract was thus changed to 4♥ (Laws 16A and 73F1) and the Panel considered the likely result in that contract.

After a spade lead to the queen (best), declarer would play a diamond to the ace followed by ace and another heart. East would win and lead a second spade to North's ace, after which declarer would play two more rounds of diamonds shedding his third spade as West ruffed. West would then lead a third spade. South would ruff and lead a third trump to East, who would have to play a minor. South would win and play minor-suit winners until West ruffed, eventually losing only four trump tricks for down one. Thus, the contract was changed to 4♥ down one, +100 for E/W.

Last year's Reisinger: decided by committee

Last year's Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams was notable for its world-class field but also for a controversial appeals decision that left many players and fans frustrated with the entire appeals process.

The extremely close final, complicated by the appeal involving the two highest-scoring teams in the event, saw the squad of Roy Welland, Bjorn Fallenius, Howard Weinstein, Steve Garner, Brad Moss and Fred Gitelman finish in the winners' circle. The final official score for the Welland team was 31.65.

Finishing second was the team of George Jacobs, Ralph Katz, Alfredo Versace, Lorenzo Lauria, Norberto Bocchi and Giorgio Duboin who finished with 31.19.

The Jacobs squad was the high scorer at the end of play but an appeal filed earlier in the second final session held the official result in limbo until the appeal could be ruled upon. The appellant in the case was the Welland team, the defendant Jacobs. The Welland team won the appeal, moving them into first place while Jacobs dropped to second.

Third was the team led by Rose Meltzer (Kyle Larsen, Peter Weichsel, Alan Sontag, Chip Martel and Lew Stansby), who had 31.00 while Rita Shugart's squad (Andrew Robson, Tony Forrester and Boye Brogeland) was fourth with 30.85.

The Reisinger, the premier team event of the Fall NABC, is a three-day contest using board-a-match scoring. A large field of 61 teams entered last year's event. The field was cut to 28 teams for the semifinal round and to 14 teams for the final round.

At board-a-match scoring, a team wins, ties or loses a board by comparing scores from both tables of play. Overtricks can be vital if the contract is the same at both tables. Here's an example:

Sontag led the ♥2 (low from odd), won in dummy with the king. Declarer then played a low diamond toward the closed hand.

Weichsel made the key playing of rising with the ♦K and returning a trump. Declarer finessed, losing to South's king, and a trump was continued.

Declarer won in dummy and took a ruffing finesse in diamonds, pitching a club. South won the ♦A and declarer soon claimed 10 tricks.

Note that if Weichsel had not risen with the ♦K at trick two, he would have exposed to the ruffing finesse which allows declarer to score 11 tricks. That is what happened at the other table, giving the Meltzer squad a win on the board.

The Reisinger

The event is contested for the Reisinger Trophy (the Chicago Trophy until 1965). It is a six-session open team-of-four event scored by board-a-match with two qualifying sessions, two semifinal sessions and two final sessions. It was contested as a four-session championship until 1966.

The event began in 1929 as the North American Open Team Championship and the prize was the Chicago Trophy, donated by the Auction Bridge Club of Chicago. (In 1928, the open team competition was for the Harold S. Vanderbilt Cup.)

The Chicago Trophy was replaced in 1965 by the Reisinger Memorial Trophy, donated by the Greater New York Bridge Association in memory of Curt H. Reisinger.

Reisinger (1891-1964), New York City, was a principal patron of contract bridge and the American Contract Bridge League in the early years of both.

Reisinger was a great-grandson of Anheuser and a grandson of Busch, co-founders of the brewery from which he inherited great wealth. That wealth enabled

him to become a stalwart financial supporter of the game, as well as a noted philanthropist on a far larger scale.

In the years when there was often a struggle to meet the League's modest payroll, Reisinger was often called upon and never failed to help with a loan or an outright gift. His support made possible several early contract bridge tournaments, clubs and books.

Among the positions in which he served were director of the United States Bridge Association, president of the Greater New York Bridge Association and chairman of the ACBL. In 1953, Reisinger was named ACBL *Honorary Member*.

Dinner raises \$26,000 for cancer research

A team game with Bill Gates and Paul Soloway, a photo safari to South Africa, a chance to bid on playing with area experts — these were highlights of Seattle's Only Bridge Burlesque dinner party, auction and show that raised more than \$26,000 for cancer research.

The dinner show — all 230 seats — was sold out “and we had five people pay \$20 each just to come to the auction,” said Barbara Nist, District 19's representative to the ACBL Board of Directors and the event coordinator.

The auction benefitted the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center, Weiss-Daling Division. The center, named for the major league pitcher and manager who died of lung cancer in 1964 at the age of 45, was established by Hutchinson's brother, Dr. William Hutchinson, a Seattle surgeon.

The theme for the bridge event was “There's No Business Like Bridge Business” featuring a salute to Broadway musicals. Each table was decorated to celebrate a musical and numbers like “Let Me Be Your Partner,” “If Ever I Would Raise You,” “Big Bidder” and others entertained the audience.

The team game with Gates, Soloway and six others was auctioned off for \$7000. Twelve local players — Gard Hays, Aidan Ballantyne, Linda Lewis, Janet Daling, Mary Ruth Blustein, Murray Blustein, Henry Lortz, Pat Dunn, Norm Featherston, Dick Yarrington, Kennedy Scholes and Neil Ballard — plus two stars of the show, Jackie Buroker and Jim Aitken, were auctioned off for future regionals. They brought in \$250

to \$500 per player.

In addition, Nist prepared a gourmet dinner for 12 people. Hendrik Sharples of District 20 donated several pieces of jewelry which brought in more than \$600.

“This was a tremendous effort by our local bridge players and family members,” said Nist. “Carole and Arne Yager brought this production to the stage. It was the lifetime dream of Joe Jabon, Mr. Show Business in our area. Unfortunately, Joe recently passed away and was unable to make the final curtain call.”

Janet Daling thanked the bridge community on behalf of the Hutchinson Center and shared a list of 22 bridge players who are working or have worked for the Weiss-Daling Division of the Research Center.

A distinct improvement

A very rich player lost a lot of money playing bridge because of exaggerated optimism. If his RHO opened 1♣, it was his habit to bid 3NT if he had an opening bid. The opponents frequently found a double, but it didn't matter — he had lots of money.

He went on a bridge cruise, and the guarantee was that you'd be a better player after taking this cruise. He told his friends that he had definitely improved, and they started a game. His RHO opened 1♣. This time he didn't bid 3NT. Instead he said, “Skip bid, 3NT.”

Miller's 5♦ made it difficult for Fisher and Sundelin

to assess their chances. Fisher decided to double, and Sundelin, after some thought, decided to go for the sure plus. Fisher cashed the ♥A and the ♣A, then switched to the ♠7, conveying the message to Sundelin to cash both his spades instead of trying to score his ♣K. Sundelin and Fisher scored plus 500, but they weren't happy about it – they could see the sure game and the very likely slam that they had missed.

Colatosti's 5♦ bid conveyed two messages – short and maybe void in diamonds and a willingness to play in slam if partner's spades were good. Malley had no problem going on to slam.

Of course there was a temptation for Levine to lead his ♦A, but he was quite sure it would be ruffed. Instead he put the ♥J on the table – queen, king, ace. Colatosti led a spade to the king and saw the 10 fall from East. He remembered the diamond preempt and decided that the 10 was very likely to be a singleton. So he ruffed a diamond to his hand and passed the ♠J. Jabbour took his queen and led a heart to partner's 10 to beat the contract and pick up 12 IMPs. If Colatosti had cashed the second high spade, his side would have gained 14 IMPs, so this worked out to be a 26-IMP swing.
