Goodwill honors Phil Wood



Phil Wood, "Mr. Bridge" in the Pacific Northwest, was honored at the Goodwill reception yesterday. With him are his family: wife Maureen, son Kyle and daughter Napili.

Phil Wood, Mr. Bridge of the Northwest, was the center of attraction at yesterday's Goodwill Reception. He was toasted, roasted and admired. The overflow crowd even sang about the glories of Phil Wood.

Phil has been directing area tournaments since 1954, and he's got one more session to go. Tomorrow is Phil Wood Day, and he's going to be on the mike in the evening.

Aileen Osofsky, chairman of the Goodwill Committee and mistress of ceremonies for the reception, told how Phil has helped spread goodwill in so many ways. "He has been our goodwill ambassador all over the Northwest," she said. Then she introduced a series of Phil fans who told stories and anecdotes about their friend.

First on the podium was Henry Francis, editor of the Daily Bulletin, who claimed that Phil began his directing career at the age of 4! Phil went to visit his grandfather who taught him how to add and subtract, with all the tricks. Phil started playing bridge in high school, but he didn't start directing until many years later. He worked with Stan Tench at first, but took over as chief director for the area when Stan's government job took him to Ottawa.

Henry pointed out that there was more to Phil's career than just bridge -- he was an accountant and a sportscaster as well.

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Corinne and Jim Kirkham bounce back from a bad first final session to win the Silver Ribbon Pairs.

Kirkhams rebound, win Silver Ribbon

Jim and Corinne Kirkham, rebounding from a 48% game in the first final session, started practicing for the Mixed Pairs and wound up winning the Silver Ribbon Pairs.

They scored 1205.20 matchpoints for a lead of about 1/3 board over Gerald Caravelli and Godfrey Chang who were second. Al Childs and Ed Lazarus were third.

The victory was Corinne's second NABC win -- she won the Women's Pairs in 1994 -- and Jim's first. With the win, Jim -- who has won more than 15,000 masterpoints -- became a Grand Life Master.

The couple were second in the IMP Pairs in 1988 and second in the Silver Ribbon Pairs in 1993. They qualified in third place but after that bad game in the afternoon, "we thought we had no chance," said Jim, "so we started practicing for the Mixed Pairs. We just wanted to get our game back. We started getting some good results, so we started playing better."

Jim, who represents District 22 on the ACBL Board of Directors, is the fourth Board member to win the Silver Ribbon Pairs. The late Joan Remy Moore won in 1993 and Virgil Anderson and Jayne Thomas won in 1994.

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2 tough days for Priscilla Smith

The surprisingly huge attendance at Vancouver 1999 has put extra pressures on the tournament directing staff, of course. Many directors have been asked to work three sessions a day -- that's about 15 hours on the job. Other directors have willingly given up their days off -- they're needed, so they pitch in and work. And of course additional directors have been called in as well. That's what happens when attendance is more than 20% above the original expectations.

Early Monday -- Boards a plane for Vancouver.

Monday, 2 p.m. -- Arrives in Vancouver and reports to Assistant Chief Director John Ashton. Ashton asks if she would be willing to work the Monday evening session. Priscilla says "Sure, just let me get a couple hours sleep."

Monday, 7 p.m. -- Priscilla reports for work as a floor director in the Knockouts and puts in a full session.

Monday midnight -- Goes to bed.

Tuesday, 8 a.m. -- She's up and running, getting ready to run the Easybridge! session at 10 a.m.

Slim slam!

It is always nice to bring home a slam on low values, especially vulnerable. It is even more satisfying when your other pair scores game on the same board. There was such a deal in the Flight A Swiss Teams.

West opened 1♠ and north bid 2♠, a Michaels cuebid. This might not be everyone's choice, and indeed, at the other table North-South were silent throughout. East bid 4♣ and just for fun with the South hand, I enquired about partner's minor by bidding 4NT. West passed, North bid 5♣ and I decided to bid 6♥, fully expecting a spade void in partner's hand. When this proved erroneous I needed some luck in the play, either diamonds 3-3 or hearts 2-1. I ruffed the spade continuation in dummy and took the diamond finesse. If it lost the opponents could make 5♠ so I wasn't unduly worried. My queen held but LHO dropped the jack. However, if diamonds were five-one I couldn't make the contract so I continued with the ace. When West followed I was able to ruff the fifth diamond good and draw trumps. An enjoyable 18 IMPs in!

Better lucky than good

Having survived by the skin of our teeth in the first round of the Vanderbilt, I emerged with some interesting material to write up. First a defensive problem.

On lead after 1NT - 3NT, you select the ♠4, which goes to the jack, king and 7. Back comes the ♠6. What do you do? And for extra credit, what would you have done if partner had returned the ♠2?

Well, this is the full story.

If the ♠6 comes back you can beat the hand by cashing out the spades, assuming that partner has foreseen the blockage. If the ♠2 comes back, it's possible to beat the hand, but it's much tougher. You have to shift at trick three -- otherwise partner gets squeezed in the minors.

Incidentally, at the table both Easts shifted to the ♠2. Both Wests won and underled a spade, letting declarer's 10 score!

I thought Henry Bethe, my partner, defended this hand very nicely.

Since dummy was supposed to put down four spades, Henry led the ♦3 to the 8, ace and 4. Back came the ♦J to the queen, and Henry played the ♦6, concealing the five-card suit. Now came a spade finesse, and declarer cashed the ♥A-K-Q -- no joy there -- partner clearly had the ♥J. Henry pitched a low spade, and declarer cashed the ♠A-K, partner producing a doubleton. Now declarer took the club finesse and Henry claimed the rest. The full hand:

Concealing the fifth diamond put declarer off the winning line of cashing the ♣A and exiting with the fourth heart.

What Are Partners For?

On the next-to-last hand of our 2nd qualifying session in Open Pairs I, I picked up: AK764, AJ7, AKQ52 and none. In third chair, I bid 1♠. Partner responded 2♣, reverse Drury. I considered exclusion key-card for clubs. But since the AK of clubs would be useful cards for me, instead I just bid key-card. My partner responded 5♦ — one keycard. I asked about the queen of trump and my partner answered that he did indeed hold that card, along with the king of clubs. Hmmmm, I thought. Perhaps 7NT was the spot. After all, it was matchpoints, and we needed something good to happen.

If, however, my partner held fewer than three diamonds, that suit might not be breaking. Electing to bid what I believed to be the "safer" grand, I chose 7♠. My LHO asked many questions, finally deciding on the ACE OF CLUBS for her lead!

My partner put down QJ32, K9, 983, KJ62, morosely commenting that I was the only partner with whom he played old-fashioned 0314 responses.

Despair quickly turned to elation, however, when I ruffed and claimed. Hey - what are partners for???

An extra entry

An interesting position arose on this deal from the first round of the Vanderbilt.

Assume the contract is 6♣ after a competitive auction in which North-South bid a lot of spades. Declarer wins the opening spade lead, unblocks the ♥A and has to lead a club. His first hope is that West has the ace and only a singleton spade. So after unblocking ♥A he leads a club, playing the 6 when West follows with the 5. The 6 — surprise! — holds the trick. Declarer now plays the ♥Q, taking the successful ruffing finesse against East. After knocking out the trump ace, he can get back to dummy with the trump king and get rid of his losers on the good hearts. If West ducks on the second trump lead, declarer wins dummy's ♣K and cashes his good hearts for the same successful result.

Did you see that West has a counter to declarer's plan? When declarer leads the ♠2 at trick three, West must play the queen! Declarer wins the king and takes the ruffing heart finesse. Later he leads the ♣3 to gain a second entry to dummy. But West counters this by rising with the ace! Now the suit is blocked -- declarer has no way to get to dummy.

So maybe declarer should lead the ♠7 instead of the 3. An alert West counters this as well -- he merely follows low and once again declarer has no way to get to dummy to cash the good hearts. An unhappy down three instead of making the slam.

Dynamic duo

George Rosenkranz and Eddie Wold play Romex and one of the features of the system is the Dynamic 1NT opening. The bid shows 18-21 high-card points and may be unbalanced.

Let's see how it works:

After diamonds were agreed, Wold learned that his partner had the key heart holding and (by inference) the ♦K.

Had Rosenkranz held the ♣Q, Wold would have been able to bid the grand slam. As it was, 6♦ was worth 24 of 25 matchpoints.

Nobody's going home

The Facts: 6♥ made six, plus 980 for E/W. E/W agreed that there was a break in tempo of six to seven seconds before the 5♥ bid was made. Their agreement was that 5♣ showed zero or three keycards and 5♦ showed one or four keycards. They have never in their long partnership played that 5♣ shows one or four keycards. East stated he noticed his misbid when the 5♥ bid was made. The Director ruled (Law 16A) that the 6♥ bid was demonstrably suggested by the slow 5♥ call and changed the contract to 5♥ made six, plus 480 for E/W.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. West stated that she was taken aback by the 5♣ bid, believing when she made the 4NT bid that partner had to have at least one ace to have enough points for a splinter bid. She agreed she took a few seconds to recount the points partner could hold before deciding he must have the ♦K and bidding 5♥. East maintained that he realized after he bid 5♣ that he had made a bidding error, but couldn't show that he had made a mistake at that time. The ace he had mistakenly not shown and his total values opposite a partner interested after a splinter bid were his justification for the 6♥ bid.

N/S had a prior commitment after the first session and could not meet with a Review Panel member. During the second session, when the decision was rendered, the

only new information N/S wanted to add was that the East hand thought for a while before bidding 6♥. In fact, he had even had his hand on the Pass Card before he bid.

The Committee Decision: The Committee determined that there was an unmistakable hesitation, and that partner could not choose from among logical alternative actions one that could demonstrably have been suggested over another by the extraneous information (Law 16A). While East had stated that he had recognized his error independently, this type of statement was self-serving. The Committee then decided to seek expert opinion about whether the slow 5♥ bid constituted unauthorized information that would prohibit East from discovering his error and bidding 6♥.

One consultant stated that any time that passes increases the likelihood that the mistake will be discovered. Partner's hesitation did not particularly suggest that East recheck his auction. Without doubt, East will bid six if he becomes aware of his error. He believed it was right to allow the 6♥ bid, but was not 100% convinced.

The other consultant stated that he would allow a 6♥ bid because East had extra values; what was partner bidding Blackwood with? He would not allow the bid if E/W were playing 1430 Keycard Blackwood responses.

The logic of both players was that usually in "hesitation Blackwood" problems, the slam bid is not supported by bridge logic. In this case, the 6♥ bid was supported by bridge logic, almost inescapably. Both players said it is hard to find cards in opener's hand that did not support a slam once she had asked for aces. Partner's willingness to stop in 5♥ itself suggests a review of the situation. Both players also said that East's statements about when he recognized the mistake were self-serving and must be disregarded.

The Committee believed that the expert player statements were strong enough to allow the 6♥ bid. The bar for allowing further action in Blackwood hesitation cases is properly placed high; but it is not insurmountable. The Committee decided that the failure to bid slam itself, rather than the slowness of the call, would cause East to discover his error.

The Committee changed the contract to 6♥ made six, plus 980 for E/W.

Sorry, Partner!

Usually when partner mis sorts his hand, disaster is in the making.

In the first final Open Pairs I session at unfavorable vulnerability, my pard Bill Kent opened 1♣. RHO bid 1♥ and I elected to bid a heavy 1NT. My LHO cuebid 2♣, and RHO subsided with 2♥.

With three clubs in my hand and poor heart spots, I didn't fancy a double. Instead I rebid 2NT. LHO doubled, and I worried that perhaps she was now about to cash six spades or something dastardly . . . but I held my ground. She led the heart deuce, and RHO put up the king as I won my ace.

As you can see, with the ♠A onside and the suit breaking, nine tricks — and a cold top — were no problem. Had my partner opened a mundane 1♠, RHO would not have had the opportunity to bid his heart suit . . . and we would have had no story!

Spots get in your eyes

In the last set of our Vanderbilt match, our opponents were faced with the most challenging of partscores -- redoubled and vulnerable to boot.

♠ J 9 6 5

♥ Q 9 7 4 2

♦ A K 4

♣ 8

♠ 10 7 2

♥ 8 3

♦ J 8 6

♣ K Q 10 9 4

♣ --

How low can you stop on the North-South cards? I misplayed 3♣ doubled for minus 500 but at the other table, the contract was 2♣ doubled and redoubled -- not a great spot but apart from the terrible trump break, the rest of the deal is as favorable as can be.

On a diamond lead, declarer can cash the top diamonds (pitching a heart), ruff a diamond and lead a heart to East's 10. A top heart comes back and you ruff and lead a spade to dummy's 9.

Another top heart is led and you ruff with the ♣5. West overruffs with the 9. This is the position:

West leads the ♣K, which you allow to hold. If he continues with a trump, you cash two rounds of trumps and throw him in with the third round -- forcing him to lead spades.

If he exits a spade, declarer cashes two spades and leads a third spade.

Declarer, holding the ♣A J 7, ruffs the spade low. West -- who is left with the ♣Q 10 4 -- can overruff but is forced to return a club into declarer's tenace for plus 760.

the cleanup between sessions.

Frank Raniolo came by to see if Matthews needed help later in the week. He reminisced about the 1993 Summer NABC in Washington DC. At age nine, he was too young to caddy and Matthews put him to work as a "runner" in the Spingold (running results from the closed room to the Vugraph area). "It was down a long flight of stairs and run, run," he says. "Ron Andersen gave me a tip -- \$10 or \$20, I don't remember."

"Yes," says Matthews, "and you tried to hire out the job then."

Warren Christie of Surrey BC began caddying at age 12. He took a break from caddying but is now going to school part-time and caddying at this tournament. "I work it all," he said.

At age 23, Christie has a good perspective on caddying. "The good side is there are a lot of nice people. The bad side is that some of those nice people are all wrapped up in their game."

Natasha Lo Chang of Vancouver has been caddying at local sectionals and regionals but this is her first NABC. Her dad, Ken Lo Chang, is playing in the Vanderbilt and her 15-year-old brother, Trevor, is caddying next door.

Natasha is getting ready to retire as a caddy -- "I think five years is enough." She'll graduate from high school this year and go on to university but has no plans to learn bridge. "I don't ever want to learn to play. Caddying is fun."

She'll leave the caddying to Trevor. "He needs the money more than I do."

Katelyn Murray of Victoria is also caddying at her first NABC. The 15-year-old has been caddying since 1996 and says her grandmother, Anna Boivin, got her the assignment.

Katelyn can't caddy team games -- she's been deaf since age two and can't hear "caddy" calls -- but she's a whiz at pair games. Being deaf can be an advantage, she said. "I don't hear rude calls."

She's played bridge once -- "but I don't remember any of the rules" -- and has plans to learn to play.

The comfort and the best interest of the players always have been Phil's No. 1 concern, according to Roger Putnam, national tournament director who has taken over in the Northwest now that Phil has retired. Roger told how Phil used to add the scores on a 25-top sheet on the mike, making comments on each pair as he added their score. "He's a consummate showman," said Putnam.

"Phil was my mentor for 30 years," Putnam went on. "He always went to bat for me, and he always gave me that extra chance. And he did the same for other directors -- he always helped us along the way."

George Rosenkranz remembered the first North American championship he ever attended -- back in Dallas many years ago. "Phil and I got stuck on an elevator with more than a dozen ladies. The women were getting very nervous and fidgety when Phil took over. He started telling funny stories, and before long the tension was eased and everybody was laughing."

Stan Tench has known Phil forever. "We both started playing at Kate Buckman's club long, long ago," he said. He especially remembered one Phil witticism that the crowd found humorous but which might have been a disaster for a different director. When calling a move in the Women's Pairs, Phil said, "Time to move the boards -- and the broads."

Tournament chairman Doug Cowan pointed out ever so strongly that Phil is NOT the honorary chairman of this tournament. "He's a real worker -- he doesn't treat his position as honorary in any way. He has been one of the hardest workers we have. He took care of filling up the hotels, and he did a lot of traveling to tell the world about Vancouver and our tournament."

His wife told about Phil's guts. "I had three teenagers, but Phil still married me back in 1979. And now we've adopted our grandchildren, six-year-old Napiili and four-year-old Kyle. There's no question about it -- Phil won't be bored in his retirement."

And now it was time to sing. Margaret Drew, Diana Schuld, Harry Ross and ACBL CEO David Silber strode to the podium to lead the crowd in singing "In

Honor of Phil Wood." The lyricist was none other than Mary Ann Silber, David's talented wife. Here's how the first verse went:

*Phil Wood, Phil Wood, how are we going to sing
So many tales about our dear Northwest King?
Though Hitchcock you may resemble, You don't
make others tremble.*

*Instead, benign, with manners fine,
You're the best type that bridge can bring.*

And then the final verse:

*Phil Wood, Phil Wood, to praise you has been
our goal.*

Within bridge you stand like a totem pole.

One short little tune can't tell it.

But all of us know, where e'er you go,

You're a man with a lovely soul!

Then Phil took the podium. "I am truly surprised. I never expected anything like this! Thank you, each and every one of you. By the way, I don't pick up halves any more, just fifths!" Phil, you haven't changed!

Osofsky then presented Phil with a framed copy of the song.

Osofsky reported that Carol Sanders, who suffered severe complications after recent surgery, is now out of the woods, according to her husband Tom.

Former ACBL President Doug Drew and former CEO Ralph Cohen paid tribute to Richard Goldberg, who died earlier this month.

The new members of the Goodwill Committee rose and identified themselves -- it was the biggest turnout of new members within memory.

ACBL President Val Covalciuc praised the work of the Goodwill Committee and noted how important goodwill is in the promotion of bridge.

Alan LeBendig, ACBL director from District 23, told of a regulation passed by the Board last week. "The first Saturday night of each NABC has been designated Dress-Up Night. We want everyone to dress up. Everyone is encouraged to do so."

Discarding an ace defeats contract

How often do you deliberately discard an ace to set up an extra trick for declarer? Not often, we're sure. But once in a while it's right, as Drew Casen proves on this deal from the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams.

Bill Pollack led the ♥8 to the queen and ace, and declarer passed the ♣10 to Casen's jack. Drew led a second heart, declarer winning in hand with the 9. Declarer crossed to dummy with a high club and led a diamond. Casen could see that declarer probably could set up a long diamond in dummy, so he started a campaign to prevent this. He followed to the diamond with the jack, covered by the queen and won by Pollack with the king. Pollack cleared the hearts and Casen discarded his ACE OF DIAMONDS!

That set up declarer's ♦10 for his eighth trick, but declarer could no longer set up dummy's long diamond. If he gave up a diamond, it would be to Pollack's 9, and Bill of course would quickly cash his hearts. Casen's farsighted play led to a one-trick defeat of 3NT.

You put on the 8 to win the trick. Then you shift to a heart to set up the sixth winner for the defense. Of course, if North shifts to hearts, declarer can escape for down one. A low club fails to set up three defensive winners in the club suit.
